THE REPORT OF THE PARISH PRIEST

As I prepare to write my report this year, there are three words which come to my mind...words which I think truly describe the sum total of our very 1983 in the Parish of St. Andrew's Timberlea with St. Luke's Lakeside. The Words are WORSHIP, and WORK and WITNESS.

In this report I shall be commenting on each of these activities as they happened within our congregations, at the parish level and beyond to the world.

At the parish level a number of special services were held. The following list provides a brief summary:

- January 16th MISSION SUNDAY for ANGLICANS in MISSION included breakfast, a presentation by Rev. Doug Woodhams, and the Holy Eucharist at 11 am at St. Andrew's.
- The Sunday Lenten Theme was shared in both churches. It was based on the beautiful old devotional hymn for Lent, "O DEAREST LORD..."
- The Wednesday Night Services, which alternated between the two churches centered on The Primate's Prayer for Anglicans in Mission.
- The Holy Week Devotions were shared between the two churches.
- On June 12 people from both congregations gathered at York Redoubt for the Annual Parish Picnic.
- On October 18th, a parish service was held at St. Luke's Church as they celebrated their Patronal Festival with Rt. Rev. A. G. Peters as The Celebrant and Preacher.
- A parish service of Evensong was held on November 11th at St. Andrew's.
- Confirmation and First Communion took place in the midst of a parish celebration with Rt. Rev. L. F. Hatfield on November 27th at St. Andrew's.
- The Annual Advent Candlelight Service was held at St. Luke's on December 18th.

As we recall our services, both regular and special, let us thank God in the words of the hymn of old:

"For the font's renewing waters,
 For the Altar's Feast Divine,
 Ministered in changeless order
 By the sacred three-fold line.
 For thy Spirit's Holy Unction
 For the Words's prophetic page,
 For the Church's Creeds undying,
 Her enduring heritage.

And in so thanking Almighty God, let us thank one another for the privilege of meeting one another in church, both in worship and in fellowship together.

Let me here record on behalf of us all our special thanks to those who so diligently care for our churches, cleaning them and making them ready for worship. At St. Luke's we especially thank Phonnie Miller; and at St. Andrew's we especially thank the Ladies of the Altar Guild who not only set up for 8 am but also clean the church between services on Sunday. I know that those of you who do this work within the church enjoy the peace which this task offers, I thank you....it is a pleasure to have such faithful sacristans.

Special thanks also to St. Andrew's Guild who have assumed the task of cleaning the church hall each week. Also special thanks to Bill Morgan and Joe Jones of St. Andrew's for their many, many little jobs done for me.

Continuing in worship, we record our thanks to Jinny Giza for her work as church organist at St. Luke's. The choir meets for practise twice a month and is learning more and more of the sung parts of Holy Communion, Morning Prayer and Evening Prayer.

I also want to thank Edith Rushton for her untiring efforts at St. Andrew's. Her report to the Annual Meeting is a very encouraging report...We are looking forward to a growing choir at St. Andrew's. Thanks to Anita Shields and to Bob Conrad for their support of the choir and of course we thank the choir members themselves as they faithful lead us in the singing each Sunday.

I am most grateful to have layreaders in the parish. They are indeed a blessing to the parish priest, particularly at The Service of Holy Communion. Barry Fraser and Jacqueline Barr work on alternate Sundays at St. Andrew's. They have helped me too to have a couple of Sundays off during the course of holidays. Thank you very much.

We are fortunate this year, also to have in the parish a student from the Atlantic School of Theology, Jack Wainright. Jack is a first year student at AST. He is with us for all the services on Sunday morning. It is a pleasure to have him among us. Our hope and prayer is that his time with us will benefit him as he responds more and more to the call of God in his life.

And finally I thank the servers of the parish. At St. Luke's we have Ardelle Giza who tends to her work every Sunday. And at St. Andrew's we have 10 servers and more coming forward. Their work in the church is most appreciated by the parish priest.

And of course, THANK YOU FOR COMING TO WORSHIP. Your presence is appreciated. I look for you every Sunday and I joy to see you take your place. I am a firm believer that there is tremendous strength in numbers. Worshipping together strengthens that we believe.

As we move on into 1984 I pray that we who worship here on earth, may be found worthy to numbered among those blessed ones who sing before the Throne of God in heaven.

TO GOD BE THE GLORY IN ALL OUR WORSHIP...

WORK:

Having thought of the activity of worship let us now reflect on our places of worship...our two churches.

Both churches have received a lot of attention in this past year.

At St. Luke's, the exterior was painted, the roof was repaired, the side steps were replaced, the entry way to the hall was painted, and the church hall thoroughly cleaned out. THANK YOU LADIES!!!

At St. Andrew's the very active Mens Club saw the completion of a number of projects this year- the choir room, the sacresty, the museum, the breezeway to the church hall, the belfry, the parking lot, and a host of other minor jobs. The major task this year was the insulation of the church ceiling. Two new frontals and an additional pew have been installed in the church along with kneelers to go with them. The Property Committee is very active.... We're just getting going. This year we plan to look at water and sewer and the church hall.

Special thanks to the Mens' Club for your efforts. I am very pleased with what I see at St. Andrew's. THANK YOU MEN!!!

Special thanks must be given to Bill Morgan and Joe Jones who spend hours and hours at St. Andrew's. Your leadership is outstanding!

As I think about our two churches I am mindful of the old hymn written by a former Dean of our Diocese of Nova Scotia,

"We love the place, O God,
Wherein thine honor dwells,
The joy of thine abode
All earthly joy excells."

And in the words of the Psalmist my own heart rejoices as I say with him, "O HOW LOVELY ARE THY DWELLINGS, / O THOU LORD OF HOSTS!"

And now let me say a word or two about the various groups at work within our parish. Let us start with St. Andrew's.

St. Andrew's Ladies Guild has enjoyed another very successful year. Success is the product of two things.... hard work on the part of the ladies of the group and all those who support them by sewing and knitting, and, our participation in the activities which they sponsor in the name of St. Andrew's. I am most appreciative of the work of the Guild as I am very conscious of the fact that their efforts are making it possible to maintain a self-supporting status at St. Andrew's. We all look forward to the day when monies raised through the Guild may be directed toward other major projects around the church. For now Guild raised monies are being directed toward the operating costs of St. Andrew's. This year St. A. General Acct. was in need of \$8000. THANK YOU LADIES!
As well it should be noted that the Guild is contributing each year \$1000 toward the rectory mortgage, for which we are grateful.

For years St. Andrew's Guild wanted to carpet St. Andrew's. This year, the church having been painted and refinished in many ways, saw that wish come true. The carpet has certainly beautified St. Andrew's. It has quieted St. Andrew's so that it is much more peaceful as we join in prayer and meditation in the church. Everyone speaks of how it has enriched the church.

The Mens' Club at St. Andrew's is well established under the presidency of Lindsay Gates. The group was able to hold three successful events this year- Fish Chowder Supper, Strawberry Festival, and Hot Turkey Supper, all very successful. This group is small but growing. And we are really happy to say that when ever an event is held, we have excellent support from many many men in our congregation.

St. Andrew's Youth Group was not active in 1983. It is an item of high priority in 1984. As parish priest I am committed to involving our young people in the worship and work of the church. In 1984 I shall be working toward that end. I ask for your encouragement.

St. Andrew's Sunday School had a tremendous year in 1983. Our Sunday Teaching classes are being augmented by many special events such as workshops, Family Services, the Christmas and Easter Pageants. We have attempted also to give a few minutes out of each Sunday Service to the children. The Sunday School is supported by an excellent teaching staff who meet regularly to review and plan together. In a church the size of St. Andrew's a strong Sunday School is critical to the future of the church. All of us, as those with an eye to the future, must do everything possible to accomodate our children in worship. They are the church of tomorrow.

Now let us turn to St. Luke's.....

This year saw the founding of St. Luke's Ladies Guild in February. This group of ladies works extremely hard and has seen very encouraging progress within a year. In addition to funding a number of necessary repairs to the church this year, the Guild was able to supplement the St. Andrew's Ladies Guild commitment to the Rectory Mortgage in the amount of \$200. I wish this group continued success as they move on in 1984.

Although there is not a formal Mens' Club at St. Luke's we are fortunate to have a number of men who will come to the rescue when help is needed. I think of Earl Miller and Jarvis Thompson who are on the spot when trouble arises suddenly with the furnace as an example. I think of Doug O'Toole who built the steps at the side door and Fred Vere-Holloway and company who painted the church. And also Bill Thompson who is always willing to give a word of advice, when required. Their support encourages the ladies in their efforts.

At St. Luke's The Sunday School is small in numbers. Darlene Duggan has assumed responsibility for the teaching and she is doing a good job. The children join the church service near the end of the service for a word or two with me.

There is much to be thankful for in 1983. Much work was accomplished. All of the groups within our parish deserve congratulations on jobs well done.

Before I leave this part of the report may I say a word of thanks to our two church councils, for their conduct of our affairs this year.....

At St. Luke's I want to say a special thanks to Ethel O'Toole who has served for several years as both Treasurer and Warden. Also thanks are to be extended to Phonnie Miller for her work as Warden, to Anne Dauphinee for her work as Envelope Secretary and to Ruth Thompson for her caring for the Memorial Fund.

At St. Andrew's I want to say special thanks to Bim Blackadar and Lawrin Armstrong, our church wardens. Special thanks to Beth Foote for her work as Treasurer of the General Acct, the Building Fund, The Cemetery Account, and the In Memoriam Account. Thanks to Tom Richardson, our Secretary to Council, to Marg Armstrong, our Envelope Secretary and to all other members of Church Council.

I can think of no better way to say thank you to all of you who have worked so hard throughout the parish than to say to each one of you, "WELL DONE, THOU GOOD AND FAITHFUL SERVANT" (Matt. 25:21)

WITNESS:

Having commented on our worship and work within the parish, I now want to say a word or two about Our Witness to His Love on every Continent and Island. I am of course speaking of our response to the call of God to Anglicans everywhere to be ANGLICANS IN MISSION.

What a wonderful response has been made to the call of God to the people of this parish. Having accepted a Covenant valued at \$21,350 our Leadership Team immediately began to initiate a program of Mission Study throughout the Parish. They organized several parish festivals and arranged for guest speakers on the theme of mission in the 80's.

The success of Anglicans in Mission in this parish was great. In commitments (paid-up and long-term) we have offered to the work of our Church some \$38,000 JUST FANTASTIC!!!!

We owe a great deal of gratitude to our Leadership Team for their commitment of time and energy to a heavy agenda of mission study and parish visitation. Special thanks to Barry Fraser, Parish Director and to Doris DeWolfe, Parish Secretary-Treasurer. And thank you to Weldon Rhyno and Edith Rushton for their unique contributions to the work of the Team. Jinny Giza did a wonderful job as she assumed special responsibilities for St. Luke's. Thanks to Anne Dauphinee at St. Luke's for handling the secretarial work for them. We thank all those who visited in the name of the Church's Mission. Your work is appreciated.

THANK YOU FOR BEING AN ANGLICAN IN MISSION!!!

Your participation made Anglicans in Mission what it is in this parish, A HUGE SUCCESS!

We are enabling the Church to carry out its vital work not only here at home in our own parish, but in many interesting ways throughout our diocese, and in the Canadian North. Beyond our Canadian scene, we are able to support work in some 40 countries around the world. We are witnessing to His Love on Every Continent and Island!

Anglicans in Mission has created opportunities for us to gather as a parish unit, to pray together, to study God's call, to respond and to work together. It has enabled us to see beyond ourselves and to go in thought, prayer, and commitment to many places in the Church of Jesus Christ, the Lord of Life. ANGLICANS IN MISSION

In 1983, we were well prepared for the Fourth Phase of Anglicans in Mission, called the Financial Development Phase, which began in January. This was due to the excellent background work by so many in the Mission Study and Mission Interpretation Phases in 1982. A special thanks is still appropriate to all those who worked with the Spiritual Development Committee to make the parish festivals such successes those various Sundays.

By January 1983, as your Director, I was so encouraged, I was sure we would double our Parish Covenant of \$21,350 that had been presented by the Diocese and accepted by the Parish as a Goal toward which we might strive.

As the Financial Development got underway with the Forward Phase, Special Phase, and General Phase, we had suddenly reached 85% of our Covenant Value by the completion of the Forward Phase near the end of February. I was elated and in the odd moment I would speak in terms of tripling our Parish Covenant Value.

It was also very encouraging to see the many new people who came forward to participate in the Special and General Phases as visitors to homes for Anglicans in Mission. As these people went out they were guided and assisted by our Parish Leadership Team of Doris DeWolfe, Edith Rushton, Weldon Rhyno, and Jinny Giza. Those who volunteered to be visitors were Brian and Millie Wilson, Florence MacFarlane, Sandra Cowie, Marilyn and Gordon Hamlin, Eric and Elsie Ingram, Judy Lafford, Emily Rhyno, and Ruth Gilkie. To all these people we, in the Parish and throughout The Anglican Church of Canada, owe a special thank you ... our parish commitment did almost double the Covenant Value of \$21,350.

To quote the man who can take credit for most of the organization and almost all of the published material at the parish level, and who worked long and hard throughout, our Rev. Fred Hiltz calls Anglicans in Mission "A Huge Success!" I agree.

The whole parish participation was one huge success. St. Andrew's and St. Luke's Congregations are among those which stand out in the whole of The Anglican Church of Canada as having been truly Anglicans in Mission.

Let us continue to be mindful during the Follow-Up and Long-Range Development Phase of the many needs of our Church throughout the world and let us rejoice together as we see the changes and the developments that our labors have wrought.

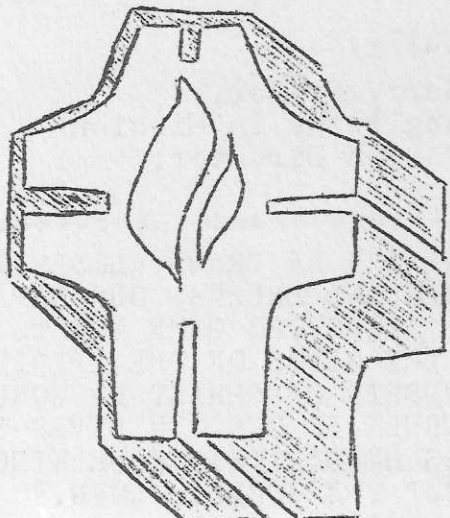
TOTAL NUMBER OF PEOPLE WHO HAVE INCREASED

THE WARDEN'S REPORT

Another very eventful year has just been completed at St. Andrew's Church, Timberlea and once again your Wardens feel very happy with the year's activities. We are sure all will agree that 1983 has been another great year in the life of our Church. The second anniversary under our current parish set up with a full-time ministry was observed during the year and all indications are that the decision taken two years earlier to re-establish a full time ministry for our Church, in conjunction with St. Luke's Church in Lakeside, was the correct decision.

Once again we extend our sincere thanks to the Rev. Fred Hiltz, who continues to exhibit his sincere dedication and enthusiasm in the spiritual leadership of our congregation. He and his family have become an intrinsic part of our Church and Parish.

As pointed out in last year's report, 1983 and the following years, would be crucial to the continuing success of St. Andrew's. As we look back at 1983 we can see that enormous strides have been made in many areas to add to those made in 1982. We feel that much has been accomplished in meeting the needs of our congregation evidenced by the continuing increased participation of our parishioners in our worship, church school and other activities.

Church attendance continues to increase and it is certain that this will continue in the future as the community experiences additional growth with the expected increased development of the area now that the new water and sewer systems are nearing completion. The various organizations within the Church continue to thrive and offer avenues of participation by our parishioners in areas that meet their individual interests.

Reports submitted by the various groups and committees will show the extent of their activities and will point out the fact that this past year has once again been a busy one. As in other years many of the efforts of these groups are quite visible, but again we must recognize the fact that many of the efforts conducted behind the scenes and not as visible, continue to manifest themselves in the efficient management of our affairs as a Church. Debts of gratitude are due all those who belong to or participate in the activities of all our groups. The Ladies Guild, the Altar Guild, the Sidesmen (and women), the Lay Readers, the Servers, the Envelope Secretary, the Spiritual Development Committee, the Property Committee, the Sunday School, the Youth Group, the Organists and Choir and the newly formed Men's Club are all to be thanked and commended for their continuing efforts and contributions. Again several areas are deserving of comment.

The members of the Ladies Guild, as well as all parishioners who support the Guild with their contributions and participation in Guild sponsored events, are once again thanked for their ongoing efforts on behalf of our Church. As well as continued financial contributions towards the maintenance of a full-time ministry this group has contributed to other projects within the Church, the most visible of which this year was the new carpeting now gracing our Church. There is no question that this new carpeting adds much to the comfort and beauty of our House of Worship. It is hoped that as our congregation continues to grow that the full-time ministry will eventually be fully supported by the weekly envelope offerings so that Guild raised monies can be used for other worthwhile projects within our Church.

We must extend a sincere vote of thanks, appreciation and support to the current leadership and staff of teachers of our Sunday School. Our Sunday School is thriving with unprecedented numbers of pupils and exhibits a genuine air of harmony and enthusiasm. This atmosphere cannot help but be reflected in the development of our children in their individual spirituality and as members of the Church of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

THE WARDENS' REPORT (Continued)

The Property Committee was again very active in 1983. The church and Rectory ceilings have been insulated, two frontals were installed in the church. A pew was repaired and placed at the back of the church. Improvements were also made to the cemetery and the parking lot. Expansion of the parking lot to the east eliminates the necessity of parking on the opposite side of the highway. The time and efforts volunteered by so many of our parishioners enabled many of these projects to be completed in a relatively short time.

In 1983 the Mens' Club of St. Andrew's was formed and it held three fund raising events. The wardens commend this group with their aims of fellowship for men together with raising resources for the betterment of the church.

At the parish level payments from both St. Luke's and St. Andrew's were applied towards the mortgage on the Rectory. Hopefully full ownership will be achieved in a few more years.

The wardens congratulate the Anglicans in Mission Leadership Team for their hard work in 1983. By personally contacting so many of our parishioners, commitments in excess of \$38,000 were made to this program, far in excess of the value of the Parish Covenant.

In conclusion, your wardens wish to thank all the members of the congregation for their support of the church through their attendance, their financial contributions and their support of our numerous projects this year.

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ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT for 1983

1983 was a year of continuing change for St. Andrew's Sunday School.

Apart from the regular teaching Sundays, 1983 was highlighted by a number of special events and exciting activities for the children.

In March, we had the very first of our Sunday School Workshops with Miss Verna Hiltz. The Easter Workshop was such a big success with the children that we arranged to have her come back in the fall.

On Palm Sunday, the children processed into church carrying palm branches and banners. Then on Easter Sunday, we opened the 11:00 am service with an Easter Pageant.

June was a busy month with a very successful Sunday School Picnic held on June 12th at York Redoubt. The next Sunday, June 19th, we held our formal Sunday School Closing with the teachers taking part in the service.

As the Teaching Year, 1982-83 closed, three of our teachers resigned after several years of service in the Sunday School. Through the efforts of Rev. Hiltz, we had three new teachers to fill the vacancies by the first part of July. Over the summer months, we met regularly to plan ahead for the fall.

The first week in September, we phoned everyone in the parish with Sunday School age children to let them know when registration would be. Because of this effort, we had a very successful Registration Sunday, on September 11th. Registration and attendance this year are up 90% with 68 children registered and an average weekly attendance of 48.

We had a formal Opening of Sunday School on September 11th at the 11:00 am service. Sunday School Schedules were distributed on that Sunday to let parents know what would be taking place each Sunday in the Sunday School. Regular classes began on September 18th with an entirely new format. The Church Hall is set up like a small church. We have a formal opening every Sunday, with prayers, songs, and offering. The children take turns receiving the offering. This is working very well as it gives the Sunday School a sense of unity.

Our first special Sunday in the fall was a Thanksgiving Workshop, which was enjoyed by all who attended. On Thanksgiving Sunday, the children paraded into church and placed vegetables, fruits, etc. at the chancel steps as thank-offerings. The gifts were later distributed to the poor.

In November we celebrated the 200th Birthday of Sunday School in Canada and on November 20th, we decorated a Liturgical Tree in the church.

December was a very busy month for both the children and the teachers. Miss Verna Hiltz, did a Christmas Workshop on December 11th, during which the children made ornaments for the Church Christmas Tree. On December 18th, the children used these ornaments to decorate a huge tree in the back of the church. After church on the 18th, the children and their parents went downstairs for a Christmas Party. To the delight of the children, Santa Claus arrived to hand out Christmas Treats. The biggest event of our Sunday School took place on December 24th, with the portrayal of The Christmas Story at our Annual Christmas Pageant. The children did a beautiful job and after the Pageant, we celebrated Jesus' Birthday with a real birthday cake.

During the fall of 1983, with attendance steadily increasing, we felt the need to look for two more teachers. We now have seven teachers and three assistants. Our teachers are Nancy Michalko, Debbie Grandy, Weldon Rhyno, Wendy Wells, Liz Robia, Carol Rozee, and Leah Fraser. Our assistants are Ellen Waterfield, Michelle LeBlanc, and Sarah Rhyno. We do not have an officially appointed Superintendent this year. The special work associated with that position is being accomplished through the monthly meeting of the Sunday School Teachers together with Rev. Hiltz.

We wish to express our thanks to all those who have helped with Sunday School in any way during the past year. A special thanks is extended to Miss Verna Hiltz and Miss Helen McBride for the time and effort they put into the Sunday School Workshops; to the Church Council for their continued support; and to Bill Morgan for the special part he played at our Christmas Party.

We also wish to say a very special thank-you to our minister, Rev. Fred Hiltz, for all the time and help he has given us in our endeavors as Sunday School Teachers.

pertinent to St. Andrews.

Rev Hiltz expressed his thanks to the congregation in terms of Worship, Work and Witness. High lighting several points he had made in his written report. A tremendous surge was made in the area of Sunday School which doubled its registration in September and is still growing, the Youth Group now has the leadership of some very able adults and is looking forward to an improved 1984, the response to Anglicans In Mission was overwhelming, the men of the church had started up a Mens Club which proved very successful with lots planned in 1984. Rev Hiltz gave thanks for those who worked so hard to improve the appearance of the church and property especially Bill Morgan and Joe Jones whose leadership and hard work in the past year was tremendous. Finally Rev Hiltz expressed his gratitude to the 1983 council and the continuing support of the Ladies Guild.

Rev Hiltz reported that a Stewardship Committee had been at work attempting to have a look at where we stand at present and where we are headed in the future concerning our financial position and looking to being self supporting in the future..

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Rev Hiltz then asked Beth Foote and Keith Fraser to present a report on behalf of the Stewardship Committee. Keith Fraser first presented a report showing our revenue and expenses for 1982 and 1983 showing that our expenses have increased by a greater percentage than our revenues. Beth Foote then presented a report outlining our commitment to full time ministry and to be self supporting giving some back ground information on the subject. Beth then showed how we stand now from both the Ladies Guild and Parishioners points of view. Beth then presented three charts showing the number of identifiable givers, deficit and Guild support. Finally Beth outlined the challenge facing us in the future to decrease our dependency on the Guild and to decrease our deficit by parishioners contributing more.

After Beth and Keith's presentation Rev Hiltz suggested that we break for coffee at 850 PM and talk the subject of Stewardship over amongst ourselves and come back with direction to Council for 1984..

After coffee two suggestions were agreed to by the congregation to be put into effect as soon as possible: (1) Prepare a written report based on material supplied in Beth and Keith presentation to all parishioners in normal handout manner. (2) Follow up with an update talk during the year to let parishioners know how we stand..

Rev Hiltz gave direction to the meeting as to the requirements of the church in accordance with Cannon 35 and previous church directives concerning election of officers.

Prior to the election of officers Rev Hiltz asked Bim Blackadar to make a presentation and to give an update on the pending water and sewer. Bim outlined the following points:

- (1) Frontage charge will be aprox \$30.00 per foot.
- (2) We have 506 feet of frontage estimated cost \$15180.00
- (3) We will be billed after job completed likely this summer. Will have up to 20 years to pay at 11% fixed interest..
- (4) The hookup between road and building aprox cost \$4000.00 (Payable to contractor).
- (5) We are looking at aprox \$5000.00 this year for hookup and plumbing.
- (6) Possibly a contractor would give us a better deal for our three properties.
- (7) Rev Hiltz has alerted the Diocese that we will be looking for some sort of assistance..

Rev Hiltz then proceeded with the election of officers.

Warden (1) Lindsay Gates nominated by nominating committee. No other nominations from the floor. Declared elected.

Treasurer Beth Foote nominated by nominatin committee. No other nominations from the floor. Declared elected.

Secretary Dave Dellapinna nominated by nominating committee. No other nominations from the floor. Declared elected.

Members At Large Grey Beswick, Joe Jones, Steve Michalko, Edith Rushton nominated by nominating committee. No other nominations from the floor. Declared elected.

Envelope Secretary Bev Dellapinna nominated by nominating committee. No other nominations from the floor. Declared elected.

Auditors (2) Grey Beswick, Weldon Rhyno nominated. No other nominations from the floor. Declared elected.
