

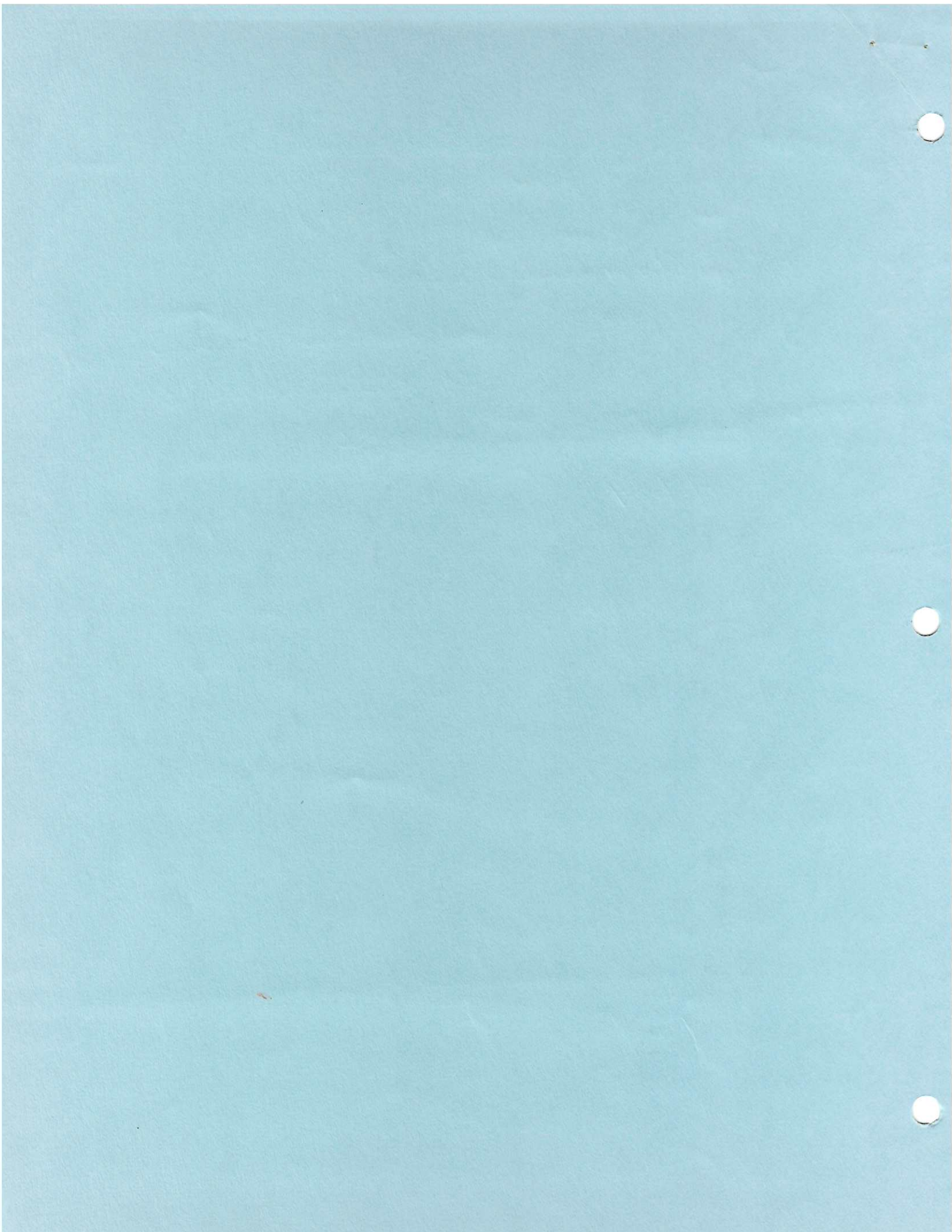

## ST. LUKE'S CHURCH WARDENS REPORT

We are happy with our progress at St. Luke's Church in the year 1984. Although we are few in number each and every one contributes time and effort to any project that comes up.

We were sad to lose our Rev. Fred Hiltz, his wife Lynne and son Nathan in September. We missed his leadership and his wise counsel in so many of our affairs. We depended on him for so many things it was only after he left we realized how very much he had helped us in all the activities we were involved in.

Our thanks goes out to Rev. Alan Sagar for his services as Priest in Charge for the remainder of the year after Rev. Hiltz left. He and his wife, Elizabeth made a lot of friends at St. Luke's and we found he was very attentive to the needs of our elderly and shut ins. During his time with us he also led us in our Bible Study and the lovely banner depicting symbols from the book of Revelation was made during this time. We were sorry when his tenure came to an end at Christmas but are happy that the Bishop sent us the Rev. Ruth Jefferson as our new Priest in Charge, to be with us until April. Welcome Rev. Ruth Jefferson to our Parish.

This year we started a Building Fund to have money set aside for the maintenance and repairs as they became necessary. Much of this money comes from bequests from families and friends of loved ones who have passed on. When it became necessary to replace our badly worn front doors this new fund covered part of the expenses, the remainder which was covered by the Womens Group. We now have double steel doors at our entrance which adds much to the appearance of our church. Also a new lock was installed on the side door opening into the vestry replacing the old one which was worn out.

Many of our colored glass windows were broken in the church. For years we had been trying to get a perfect match for the color but it is no longer available. It was necessary to change the color to the nearest matching color we could get. Estimates on this job proved to be very costly, we are happy to report that Eldon Clattenburg did all the glazing for us with the cost only for the materials. Thank you Eldon for a job well done.

The church belfry is still giving us trouble. We have had a repairman several times but they don't seem to be able to fix that leak.

Plexiglass has been installed on the vestibule windows and we no longer have to worry about having them regularly broken out. However the basement windows are being broken by vandals so the year 1985 will have to see plexiglass installed on these windows also.

Again we have been plagued by flying ants in our basement. The exterminator guaranteed his job so when the ants returned we had him come back to spray again and yet again. This time hopefully our problem is solved. The year will be up in April and if the ants return when they appeared before we will still be under guarantee, but we hope we have seen the last of them.

The Womens Group have replaced our old worn out plastic curtains in our basement windows with new gold colored mesh ones, it adds a cozy look to our little hall for our penny auctions and occasional meetings and entertainments we hold there.

Our Womens Group have been keeping busy as usual. This year we have held two penny auctions, an Easter sale and a Christmas sale. The girls are busy with their crafts all year long for these activities, as will we have catered to a wedding, our first, it was a great success. Our other money making activities include selling church calendars and saving Sobeys slips, to be turned in for cash. For the first time we have had a picture of our church on a church plate, we have sold quite a number of these and still have a number left for anyone who is interested. Since all the members of this group are also active in everything that goes on in the church we must say thank you for all the little extras, lawn mowing, planting of flowers, snow blowing, shovelling and plowing, the cutting of the tall bushes along the front the the property, the painting of the front steps, the cutting and fitting of the plexiglass and at times when it was needed the help of all the spouses and families who pitched in and took up the slack.

We have had some monetary gifts to our Memorial Fund as well as the placement of several Prayer Books and Hymn Books in memory of loved ones.

All our commitments have been paid to the Parish Account including our percentage of the water and sewer expenses for the Rectory.

We are looking forward to continued progress in the year ahead and in conclusion would like again to thank all our Parishioners for their help and financial support in the past year, to Jinny Giza and the Choir for their faithful attendance at all the services and to all who come and worship with us in our beloved little St. Luke's.

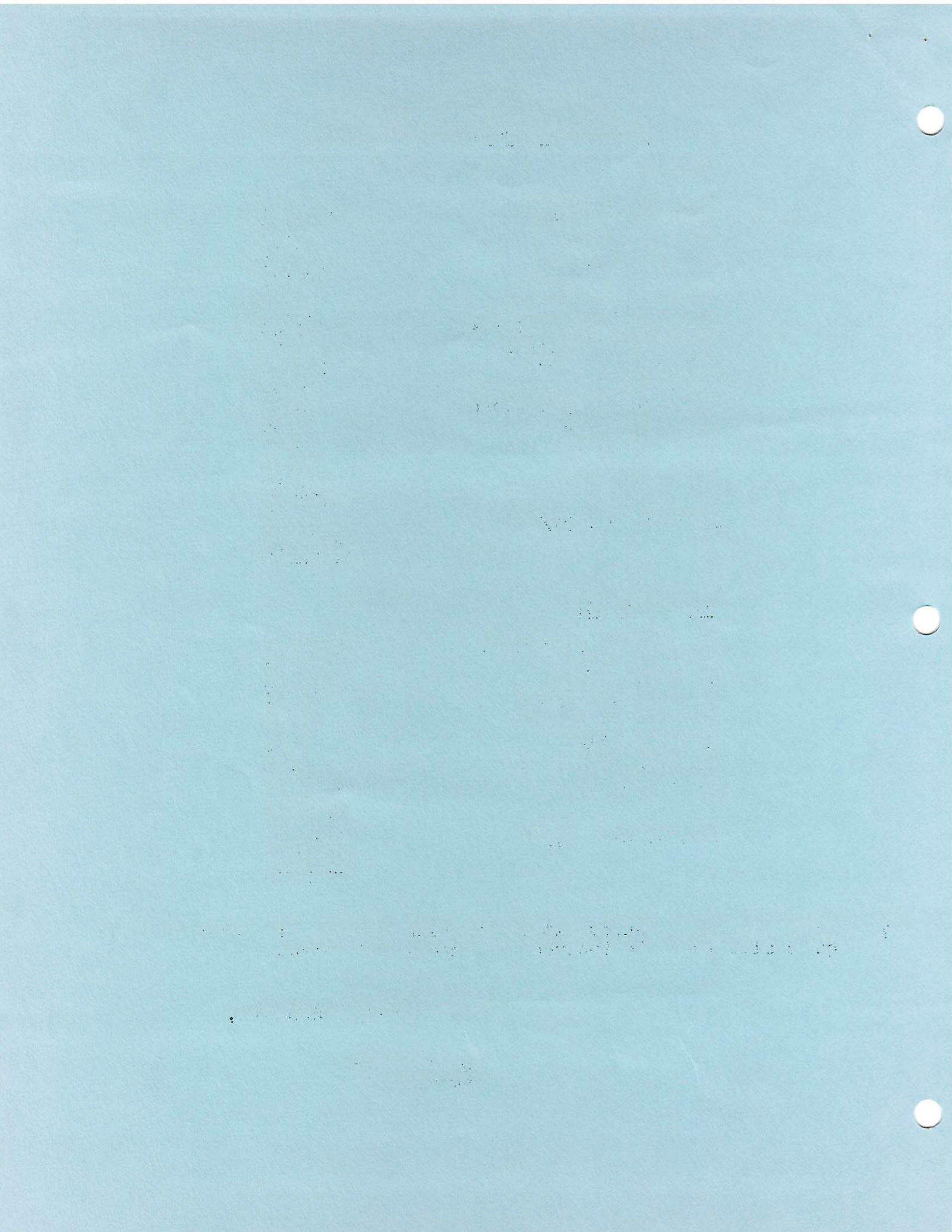

## ST. ANDREW'S CHURCH SUNDAY SCHOOL REPORT for 1984

1984 proved to be another exciting year for St. Andrew's Sunday School.

Attendance was down for the first month or so of the year but it wasn't long before it was back up to an average of 48.

On April 8th, we held our Easter Workshop under the guidance of Miss Verna Hiltz. The children made Easter Banners for their homes. On April 15th we had our Palm Sunday Procession, after which the children gathered at the front of the church to sing for the congregation.

We had a special Family Service on Good Friday at 10:30 a.m. for the Sunday School children and their families. There were 27 children in attendance.

The Easter Sunday Service began with our annual Easter Pageant. During the service, the children sang for the congregation. After church, Easter Bunnies, which were donated by the Lions Club, and Easter Eggs, bought by the Church Council, were passed out to the children.
